# **Daily Market Highlights**

# 24-Nov: Policy continuity boosted yields

Yields pushed up further by Powell's renomination; USD strength waned Crude oil prices jumped as US and key countries said will tap into reserves PMI readings showed strong economic activity in the US, Eurozone, UK

- US stocks ended Tuesday's session on a mixed note as economic optimism boosted cyclical shares and helped offset the continuous selloff in tech shares. The S&P 500 rose 0.2% alongside the Dow Jones which added 0.6% while the tech-focus NASDAQ shed 0.5%.
- US treasury yields continued to rise in response to Fed Chair Jerome Powell's nomination for a second term. The traditional move of renominating Fed Chair signals policy continuity at the Fed and reaffirmed general expectations that the central bank will stick to its policy normalisation path which involves a postpandemic first rate hike next year. The yield on the benchmark 10Y UST picked up 4bps to 1.67%.
- The USD strength waned into Tuesday's session. The dollar recorded mixed performances against G10 currencies. CAD and EUR traded modestly higher while JPY and GBP weakened. The dollar index fell marginally (-0.06%) to 96.49.
- USD/MYR advanced 0.3% to 4.1985 earlier. Weekly outlook for USD/MYR remains neutral-to-bullish, premising on expectations for a still firmer USD, with little domestic catalyst to drive the MYR. We are eyeing a range of 4.16-4.20 this week.
- Gold prices edged lower for the fourth session. Futures shed 1.3% to \$1783.8/oz. Crude oil prices jumped as the market has priced in the US government's tapping into its petroleum reserves. The US plans to release 50mil barrels of crude from its Strategic Petroleum Reserve alongside the world's largest consumers namely, China, Japan, UK, India and South Korea in a coordinated effort to curb the surging prices. The move aims to protest the OPEC+'s refusal to accelerate production which may help ease prices. Brent crude rallied 3.3% to \$82.31/barrel while WTI climbed 2.3% to \$78.50/barrel.
- ECB board member Isabel Schnabel said in an interview that the region's inflation
  risks are skewed to the upside and said that plans to end the pandemic emergency
  bond buying program (PEPP) are still valid despite the fourth Covid-19 wave in
  Europe. The remarks suggest that the ECB attempts to join its counterparts in
  withdrawing pandemic stimulus. BOE Governor Andrew Bailey said that the MPC
  may reduce forward guidance on rates and decisions could be made meeting-bymeeting.

## PMI readings point to solid expansion in the US, Eurozone & UK:

 Private sector expansion in the US remained strong despite labour shortages and supply chain bottlenecks. The flash Markit manufacturing PMI reading for the US rose to 59.1 in November (Oct: 58.4). The services PMI came in at a lower but still reasonably solid level of 57.0 (Oct: 58.7).

- The Eurozone's economic activity expanded at a faster pace in November before
  the resurgence of a new Covid-19 wave that spurred possibilities of stricter
  restrictions or even national lockdowns. The Markit manufacturing PMI rose slightly
  to 58.6 (Oct: 58.3) while the services PMI advanced considerably to 56.6 (Oct: 54.6).
- Meanwhile in the UK, manufacturing PMI climbed to 58.2 in November (Oct: 57.8) while the services gauge slipped to 58.6 (Oct: 59.1), indicating that business activity continued to grow at a decent pace nonetheless.

#### Singapore's 3Q growth revised higher to 7.1% y/y:

Singapore's 3Q GDP growth was revised higher to 7.1% y/y, from 6.5% y/y in the advance reading. This followed the 15.1% y/y expansion in 2Q. On a q/q comparison, the economy turned around to register a strong 1.3% expansion (revised from +0.8% q/q in first estimate) following the 1.8% q/q contraction in 2Q during which the government imposed strict restrictions to counter the Covid-19 resurgence. The rebound was supported by the services sector growth as manufacturing output edged lower slightly amid the supply chain bottlenecks.

## Singapore's CPI inflation accelerated in October:

- Singapore's CPI inflation accelerated to 3.2% y/y in October from 2.5% y/y in September; the reading came in higher than the consensus forecast of 2.8% y/y, attributed to the low base effect from last year. m/m, from 0.4% previously. The stronger y/y gain reflected stronger private transport and accommodation inflation as well as higher services and food inflation and a smaller decline in prices of retail & other goods. The MAS core inflation rose to 1.5% y/y in the same month (Sep: +1.2%).
- On a month-on-month basis, inflation slowed to 0.3% (Sep: +0.4%). The modest increase was driven by the increase of car prices. Core CPI picked up 0.3% m/m (Sep: +0.2%) thanks to higher services costs, electricity and gas costs.
- The MAS said that rising imported and labour costs alongside the recovery in domestic economic activity are expected to support a steady increase in core inflation in the quarters ahead. It expects core inflation to come in near the upper end of 0-1% forecast range in 2021 and to further increase to 1-2% in 2022.
